### Prayer:

# Sermon:

- Last week we considered the notion of Surrender to Love.
- Surrender is not to be confused with compliance doing what we're told out of fear of the consequence → complying with Corona virus restrictions.
- Surrender is a willing desire and choice to lay down one's life for the sake of taking up what is offered Jesus the Good Shepherd:

"For this reason, the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. <sup>18</sup> No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again." (John 10:17-18)

- Surrender is something we want to do, and therefore, we willingly lay down our life for what we can and want to take up.
- Also, surrender frees us from self-preoccupation. When we are so focussed on our self, our wants or on our lack, we become preoccupied with it.
- Surrender frees us from being caught in our self and allows us to take up the values and desires of the kingdom of God.
- We are invited to surrender to God's love. God's love is not dependent upon our behaviour, but rather, is the character and nature of the Father.
- The parable of the prodigal: the younger rebellious son, and the older moral upright son did nothing to receive or diminish the Father's love it was his character and nature.
- Today we are looking at Surrendering to the Love of God that eliminates our fear.
- A biblical understanding of fear is described as a state of panic or flight. It is the desire for self-preservation and protection in the face of overwhelming powers.
- A great illustration of this is found in our Gospel reading from Matthew:

"Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. <sup>30</sup> But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!"" (Matt. 14:29-20)

- Peter was doing well until he became more concerned about the waves than about Jesus.
- His distressing circumstances distracted his attention and weakened his faith in Jesus.
- In this instance, Peter experienced a state of panic, and his desire for self-preservation and protection kicked in and as he started to sink, he cried out to Jesus for help.
- Not only was the tumultuous water terrifying for the disciples in their boat, but the storm at sea heightened their fear because the Israelites regarded the sea as the domain of evil power.
- The terrifying experience of a storm at sea in the dead of night becomes deeply symbolic of the human experience with evil.
- The fear of the disciples is like the fear of all who are threatened by insecurity in the face of the unknown.
- This season we are currently in where we are faced with worldwide health concerns, economic fragility and social isolation is equivalent to Peter and the disciples experience on the storm-tossed sea.
- Life will often throw us curved balls that threaten our security and cause us to face an unknown future.

- For the disciples it was the evil of a stormy sea, for us it is the evil of a barely visible virus. Both are extreme expressions in size, yet regardless of how big or how small the threat is, **fear has the capacity to paralyse us.**
- Fear manifests itself in different ways for different people: some people live within restrictive boundaries where they appear quite cautious and conservative. Therefore, they tend to avoid, and be highly vigilant.
- Others who live in fear are compelled to remain in control. They attempt to control themselves and they attempt to control their world.
- Perhaps you can identify a time when fear overcame you...where you became overly cautious, avoidant and highly vigilant; or perhaps became super controlling of yourself and others.
- Fear is a natural response when our security is threatened and we are facing an unknown future, but, hear this incredible word of hope:

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us." (1 John 4:18-19)

- The love John is talking about here, is the same love we heard about last week the perfect love of the Father.
- Love that is not dependent upon our behaviour, but rather, love that flows from the character and nature of the origin of Love → God.
- There is no fear when we are held safely and securely in the arms of pure, undefiled, perfect, unconditional, everlasting love.
- Our Gospel story is a perfect example of this:

"Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" <sup>32</sup> When they got into the boat, the wind ceased." (Matt 14:31-32)

- We do not know the tone of voice Jesus used with Peter in this verse a harsh reprimand, or compassionate reassurance.
- What we know is, when Jesus appears to those in need, He has sovereign power not only over the forces of nature but over fear itself.
- Jesus didn't just have power and authority over the wind and waves, He has power and authority over what they represent in our life.
- For the disciples it was evil that was symbolized by the stormy seas; for us it might be loneliness, the effects of an economic downturn, the concern and pain of ill health, or anything else that may threaten our security or generate an unknown future.
- Hear these words of truth: Jesus is present in the midst of the wind and waves, and Jesus has power and authority to calm them.
- Therefore, fear is eliminated where Jesus is present.
- His words to the disciples in the boat that night, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid" are not empty or meaningless.
- He knows how we respond to anything that threatens our need for control. And he knows how we fear our security being taken away.
- God understands our tendency to fear. And in gentleness God invites us to let Him rid us of our fears and heal us by His loving presence.
- Jesus is the antidote to fear. Not our beliefs about God, or our self or others. Not our knowledge of the bible, not even attending worship via Zoom will eliminate our fear.
- Only the presence of Jesus eliminates our fear.
- Jesus doesn't necessarily eliminate the threat; He eliminates our fear and gives us courage to face the threat.
- The courage to face challenging situations comes from feeling deeply loved and safely held by God.
- So basically, our gaze needs to go back and forth between divine love and our fears. We gain courage to face our fears as we soak in love.

• So, what does it look like to soak in God's love so much so, that it eliminates our fear...

Personal example – competency over connection out of fear of not being seen as valid.

- Surrender to love eliminates our fear. It doesn't eliminate the threats but it does eliminate the fear.
- We will continue to be confronted with situations that challenge us but knowing and experiencing the presence of Jesus eliminates the fear of the situation and gives us courage and strength to be and do all that we are called to.

"They cried out in fear.<sup>27</sup> But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."" (Matt. 14:26-27)

In the same way also, He took the cup after supper saying:

'This cup is the new covenant made in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, for the remembrance of me.

For as often as we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until He comes. And so according to our Saviour's command, we set this bread and this cup apart for the holy supper to which He calls us.

# Prayer of thanksgiving:

God, you are the very essence and nature of love. Everything about you – who you are and what you do radiates from your love. And you made us in your image to love and be loved. We praise you for your eternal, faithful, everlasting promises to us, and we praise you for your son Jesus.
